Making export trade more accessible

The PCREN has been working with Summer Street Industries and local small businesses to explore and develop a model that will provide inclusive employment and small business growth. The model will give small local businesses packaging support that will assist them in scaling up their orders to export to markets outside of Pictou County.



The model has seen its first success the Big Cove Foods who have recently packaged spice orders through the support of Summer Streets' co-packing abilities. Summer Street and the PCREN are now entering its second phase of the co-packing project which will including introducing more small businesses to this model.

Exploring Pictou County through virtual reality



As a phase one, the Pictou County Regional Enterprise Network has been working with NSBI and local businesses to create an immersive, informative, and interactive experience of Pictou County through virtual reality to aid in Nova Scotia's investment attraction efforts. Pictou County will be part of the Nova Scotia wide attraction video, and additionally, will have its own video showcasing a sample of the various "makers" and "industries" that call Pictou County "home."

Welcome to a place that you can call home

Welcome Home Guide - The Pictou County Regional Enterprise Network was pleased to be a partner on development and launch of a comprehensive guide.

This 92-page guide to Pictou County, Nova Scotia – A community guide to the place we call home, was developed by Healthy Pictou County, who received funding for the project through Communities, Culture



and Heritage's Healthy Communities Fund, the Pictou County Chamber of Commerce, Destination Eastern and Northumberland Shores (DEANS), and the Pictou County Regional Enterprise Network. The group solicited content from Pictou Landing First Nation, the six municipal units and community organizations, individuals and businesses.

Supporting a buy local movement

The PCREN partnered with ten local businesses and Summer Street Industries. a local social enterprise, to launch curated boxes of Pictou County goods. Three boxes at different price-points and product offerings were constructed. All 195 boxes were sold out within 12 days, with overwhelming support




for more curated local boxes to be available in the future.

The purchase of a curated box directly provided support to several local small businesses. Additionally, each box gave a small contribution to projects lead by Summer Street Industries and the Pictou County Regional Enterprise Network (PCREN). These projects support the growth and resiliency of Pictou County's economy and provide inclusive employment opportunities for people with intellectual disabilities.

Supporting small businesses in getting online

The Pictou County Regional Enterprise Network (PCREN) received \$40,000 in funding from the Government of Canada, through the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA), Regional Relief and Recovery Fund to support local businesses with creating or enhancing their online presence. The PCREN has committed \$20,000 to the ecommerce fund for a total of \$60,000 that was distributed to 20 businesses through an application process and provided support to them in building or enhance their website or ecommerce platform.



Building a strong workforce is important for a vibrant community!

That is why, the Pictou County Regional Enterprise Network is continuously working to understand the challenges, successes and opportunities local employers are facing in securing skilled staff, and how to best support them in recruiting and retaining skilled employees.

We are looking at approaches and solutions that will create opportunities for under-and-unemployed community members, as well as the recruitment of skilled workers internationally, to address labour gaps.

A labour market survey, released in January 2021, was responded to by 51 local employers. Twenty-six of the respondents reported labour market shortages. Out those employers, twenty-one indicated wanting to learn more about the various immigration options available to assist with addressing their labour shortages.

The PCREN, at pictoucounty.com, also provides access to data on demographics, labour force, transportation, education and more.

Navigating immigration supports

Specifically, through federal and provincial funding, a staff member has been assigned to help employers learn more about the provincial immigration programs and how these programs can help address the labour needs of the community.

The Government of Canada, through the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA), provided the PCREN with a non-repayable contribution of \$42,500 to support a employer immigration pilot program. An additional \$42,500 was provided by The Province of Nova Scotia, through Nova Scotia Office of Immigration and Population Growth (NSIPG).

The PCREN has interacted with 79 employers on labour market and immigration navigation in 2020-2021.

The PCREN continues to support employers with immigration navigation, and are developing tools to assist Pictou County employers in becoming immigration ready.

Connecting employers with new graduates

While finding employment has been markedly more challenging in 2020 due to the pandemic in some sectors, Connectees continue to express gratitude for this no-cost program, for their Connectors as well as for all the information about the local community they receive which helps them feel more

In the second year, the Connector Program has focused heavily on maintaining strong relationships with referral partners. Each of these partners play a pivotable role in the continued success of the program. Continuous communication with these partners has resulted in better serving clients by utilizing networks and services. Fortyfive active Connectors are currently enrolled.

The Pictou County Regional Enterprise is leading a local team of 10 community leaders through the MIT Regional Entrepreneurship Acceleration Program –Nova Scotia (MIT REAP-NS). This program provides opportunities for communities around the world to engage with MIT in an evidence based, practical approach to strengthening innovation driven entrepreneurial ecosystems. Locally, this skilled cross-sector group of business and education leaders will be implementing a project that will strengthen the business ecosystem in Pictou County.

Pictou County - Made for Makers

Through the PCREN strategic plan, it was unanimously endorsed from the municipal units and Pictou Landing First Nation to brand Pictou County as a collective region. Over many months, the PCREN worked with a committee of community members and a consultant to develop the brand. This process included input from public surveys collected for the Strategic plan and an evaluation of the community. It resulted in an "economic-focused" brand approach with brand objectives, personality, position, tagline, and logo created.

The brand has several key features:

- It is versatile in nature, being able to be adapted to represent specific sectors and initiatives when opportunities arise.
- It focuses on our collective prospects as an economic area.
- It redefines rural, intended to evoke a "Wow, that's not what I expected to experience from a rural region" reaction.

The brand speaks to Pictou County's past in shipbuilding, rail car making and steel production, while providing a platform to share about "who we are now" – a new type of maker. The brand is bright, refreshing, genuine, resourceful, gritty, and thriving. Its essence is "Pictou County – made for makers."

In the next phase of a brand for Pictou County, the PCREN will be developing ideas, in conjunction with the community, around how it can be used more broadly by local businesses, organizations, campaigns, and activities. Access to the brand guidelines and artwork files are available by request from the PCREN.

Labour Mobility pilot project

The PCREN has been working with several national and international partners, as well as the Federal and Provincial government, to explore new and innovative approaches to solving chronic and increasing labour shortages.

Over the past two-years Pictou County has been a pilot site being the first of its kind to take a community driven labour mobility approach. This approach matches skilled refugees to employment opportunities in our region which employers have been unable to fill.

The PCREN is also sharing its experience of "community driven" economic immigration efforts with economic development colleagues in other provinces. The project received enthusiastic support and interest from local employers who face chronic and increasing labour market shortages, and who are committed to taking a two-pronged approach of: 1) creating opportunities for existing under-and-unemployed community members; and 2) simultaneously recruiting skilled workers internationally to address labour gaps.

The labour mobility project has currently seen five placements filled with a local employer with many others in the process. This model is now moving out of its pilot phase and will be expanding to other communities nationally and globally in partnership with the Shaprio Foundation, Talent Beyond Boundaries, and RefugePoint.

This program has found a unique solution to fill labour market gaps, grow our community, and position Pictou County as innovative on a national and international stage.
